the D'varim ~ from Rabbi Poticha

In 1996 then-First Lady of the USA Hillary Rodham Clinton presented her vision for the children of America. She published her book: It Takes a Village: And Other Lessons Children Teach Us.

She focused on the impact individuals and groups outside the family have, for better or worse, on a child's well-being and advocates for a society which meets all of a child's needs. The book's title is attributed to an African proverb: "It takes village to raise a child" ("ora na azu nwa" in the language of the Nigerian people).

I am not making a political statement by mentioning this book, but I mention it because since it's publication many people use the phrase: "it takes a _____ to _____" you can fill in the blanks. Simply, I think this means that it takes more than one committed person to make any action a positive reality and have positive impact, as the opening statement of the book suggests: "We cannot live for ourselves alone. Our lives are connected by a thousand invisible threads, and along those sympathetic fibers, our actions run as causes and return to us as results" – Herman Melville.

In that spirit I can say: it takes a minyan* to create, build and enhance a synagogue community. Even in the 21st century, when a person can pod cast talks on G-d (called "G-dcasts") and can webstream live worship services and lectures, we still need committed individuals with shared values to come together striving towards common goals. How will continuity be maintained if there is no one to share common goals, if we do not together envision and make our future a reality? Our strength is in the combination of all of our different interests and professional specialties, which come together, expressed through culture and values: "it takes us to build, maintain and expand our synagogue community".

In recent months, our board has worked hard re-envisioning their tasks through the work of their committees. Their work continues as they try to make their committees more responsive to the needs of our community and to our congregation. Yes, it takes a board willing to do hard work to maintain/sustain and enhance their synagogue community. It also takes congregants/members coming together in prayer, song, and common values to share in our past stories, write our stories of today and with 21st century fore thought envision our future. It takes each one of us, framed by our Festivals, holidays, our traditions and demands of our modern world to help us create and sustain our synagogue community.

Yes, together, it takes us!

*Minyan: historically has meant a group of 10 adult Jews required for a legal quorum. It also means a group of committed Jews who come together as a community or a part of a larger community.

Religious School March/April/May 2010

Students in our religious school celebrated Tu' Bshevav with a seder and donations were made to JNF to plant a tree in memory or in honor of a loved one. Students are looking forward to celebrating Purim at the Purim Carnival on Feb. 28th and preparing for Passover in the coming weeks. We thank our Parent's Committee for coordinating the carnival and putting together Mishloach Manot packages for our students and families. Our fifth grade class did a wonderful job leading Friday night services and we are very proud of them.

In Hebrew class the second/third, fourth, and fifth grade classes have been diligently studying their Hebrew letters and vowels. The second/third graders received their Alef Bet cards to practice with in class and at home. The fifth grade learned how to sing the Friday night Kiddush with the help of their newly burned CDs that have all the Friday Night prayers on them. The sixth and seventh grade also received new CDs with the Saturday morning prayers on them. The sixth grade is having fun learning the tunes of the prayers for Saturday morning, especially Yotzer and the V'Ahavta. The seventh graders are regularly meeting with their tutor, either Miss Liz or Mrs. Rudin, to practice their Torah portions and prayers in preparation for their Bar or Bat Mitzvah.

In Miss Liz's Bible class our fifth, sixth, and seventh graders learned about the Torah portion of the week. Students are encouraged to think critically and ask questions, in order to develop a deeper understanding of the stories and lessons of the Bible. They have already learned about our forefathers and foremothers, and about the Hebrews being enslaved in Egypt. We are now learning about when the Jewish people received the Torah in the desert. We will be focusing on how relationships, both between man and God as well as interpersonal, developed during the forty years in the desert.

In Miss Paula's 4th Grade Prophets Class the students have learned about Adam and Eve, Cain and Abel, Abraham and Sarah and Isaac and Rebecca. In Miss Paula's 2nd/3rd Grade class the children have learned the 10 Commandments and how the Jewish people received them. They enjoyed learning to remember the Sabbath with grape juice and Challah and reciting the blessings for each. The students also learned the blessings for lighting the Sabbath candles and the Shema prayer.

In our Jewish History classes the fourth graders have been reading stories that cover the highlights of Jewish history from the age of the patriarchs to the destruction of the Second Temple. Our fifth graders have been reading stories that cover the journey of the Jewish people from the beginning of the Diaspora to the present day. The sixth graders completed the book Let Freedom Ring and learned about Jewish American history. They will be beginning a new unit on the Holocaust.

In Miss Laurie's Basic Judaism classes our students have been learning about belief, ritual, Jewish law, and tradition in Jewish life.

On March 5th we look forward to having our 4th graders lead the Friday night service and a class dinner for the 7th grade class. It is a potluck dinner to be enjoyed by the families of the 7th grade children before the service with the Oneg (dessert) prepared by the class leading the services. Be sure to include the grandparents in this special evening.

On March 21st we will have our Religious School Model Seder lead by Rabbi Poticha. After the seder the rabbi will be meeting with our 6th grade parents to plan for their B'nai Mitzvahs.

The fifth, sixth and seventh graders can greatly improve their Hebrew reading by practicing each day for ten minutes using their CDs containing the prayers.

Wishing you a happy Purim and a meaningful Passover.
